

## THE GREAT DEBATE

### THE ETHICS OF TAKING ON A MONSTER OF A CLIENT.

The newspaper accounts make him look like a murderer: he had motive, accessibility, time and experience. He turned down a plea for five years. The jury sentenced him to life without parole. Overnight he has turned from “that monster” to “Mr. Client.” How do I handle this?

This is the situation many criminal defense investigators are faced with regularly. Family and friends question “how can you represent that scum?” You question yourself and wonder if you can do anything for this man who was convicted of killing another in the most horrific way.

These are tough decisions: should I take the job? Can I afford not to take the job? I respect the attorney but I’m not sure that the client is going to win on post-conviction appeal. What do I do?

Now is the time for the great debate

If I am fortunate enough to have a partner or colleague with whom I can talk this out I will enlist their aide. Many times I’m doing it on my own and so I have to wear both hats and argue both sides of the case, preparing for it as if I was back in college on the debate team. This is what I do:

1. I read everything possible about the case.
  - a. The original police reports and interviews
  - b. The media coverage
  - c. The evidence collected and analyzed
  - d. The pre-trial discovery motions
  - e. The depositions
  - f. The trial itself
  - g. The jury voir dire
  - h. Any post-conviction coverage in the media/on line/in the ether sphere
2. I make notes of everything positive that can be used as a basis for investigation.
3. I make notes of everything negative that will only reinforce the verdict
4. I look for:
  - a. Batson material (the jury was prejudiced by being racially or ethnically 100 percent different from the client).

b. Brady material (information that was not revealed during or prior to the trial by the police or prosecutor that might affect the outcome).

c. Ineffective Assistance of Counsel (IAC) indicating that the attorney did or did not do a thorough investigation and understand the case he/she was entrusted to defend.

d. Snitches who might have received a benefit for testifying against the client.

e. Witnesses against the client who might have a reason to lie (protecting themselves or another).

f. Prior investigations done by an independent investigator or member of the legal firm.

g. Mitigation in the event that there was a historic reason for the events to have occurred.

Then I put on the hat of the prosecution and argue that the case was fairly presented and the verdict properly judged. I argue out loud all the points that make this man a heinous

felon. I bring in his familial history and past crimes. I look at the police involved and their veracity. I discuss the evidence presented to the jury and how they would have viewed it. I do everything in my power to verbally prove the jury correct and the sentence just. I am talking to myself, and it is a valuable discussion.

Once I have depleted all of this information and convinced myself or my colleagues of his guilt, I take off the prosecution's mantle and put on the hat of the defense. I start from scratch and talk about the innate prejudice of the community, the unfair media coverage, and the leaked evidence that was tried in the news before it was heard in the courtroom. I look at who was on the witness list for the prosecution and who was never interviewed by the defense. Who testified and who did not? I seek rationale for others to have committed the crime, to have lied, to have fingered "Mr. Client" for their own reward. I check the

prison log to determine how often the attorney met with the client prior to the trial. I look at the original plea deals to determine if the attorney might have been taking the easy way out and not even considered the possibility of innocence. I look for the source and quantity of financial remuneration to the attorney. Was it worth his/her time to even do an investigation or was it a court appointed case to be dispatched quickly so that some money remained of the minimal retainer. I do everything in my power to verbally cast a shadow of doubt on the case that the jury has heard and rendered a verdict upon. After all, I am speaking to myself and I am a tough customer to convince.

It is this second argument that forms the basis for my investigation. If I can thoroughly, ethically and without prejudice evaluate the facts of an arrest and trial then I can honestly provide the best representation for my client. I now know the case from all sides. I no longer have a debate. I am representing a human being with the

possibility of procedural error or actual innocence who has been rendered guilty because no one looked at the entire case up until this time. I am doing my job.

The only person who loses the debate is the one who does not engage in it. While I am seeking information and evidence in this form I am also re-evaluating myself with each question; each statement. I am now prepared to be an investigator worthy of my profession.

# NO BULL

Many of you may be well aware that Pennsylvania is one of the largest dairy producing states in the United States.

Dairy products are Pennsylvania's number one agricultural product. It ranks number eight in the United States for milk and cheese production and number two in the United States for butter production.

The dairy industry in Pennsylvania is a two-billion dollar a year industry. What many people are unaware of is the theft that is attempted at auctions. How do you know that the prize Holstein steer you just paid \$200,000 for at auction is the one you will be walking home with? How do you know no one switched one steer for another?

For large auctions such as the Pennsylvania Farm Show, the Pennsylvania State Police train fingerprint and footwear impression experts to be able to identify Bovine Nose Prints.

The rhinarium, Also commonly called the snout, nose or muzzle, does not have friction ridge skin the way a human finger or toe print does, but the patterns of ridges, grooves and bumps on a cow's nose are a unique pattern that allow the print to be used in identification. Like fingerprints, no two nose prints (or muzzle prints) are exactly alike. These patterns are distinct to each individual cow and steer and remain unchanged throughout its life.

A cow's muzzle, or planum nasolabiale, has a textured surface made of keratinized skin. This surface is kept moist by secretions from glands under the surface that create the bumps, ridges and grooves. This unique pattern has long been used by farmers, forensic specialists to identify individual cattle for breed registration and ownership.

And that's No Bull!



# 2025 James P. Carino Investigative Professional of the Year Award Criteria

**A candidate for the award must:**

**Be a current PALI Member in good standing.**

**Have been a PALI member for one full year.**

**(There may be limited exceptions to the full year qualifier)**

**Can be nominated by another PALI member**

**Can nominate themselves.**

**The reason for the nomination must be VERIFIABLE.**

**The reason for the nomination does not have a time frame.**

**The reason for the nomination does not need to be investigation or security service related.**

**Reasons for nomination could be:**

**1) Investigation or security service related**

**2) Contribution for the betterment of the PI or security professions**

**3) Contribution for the betterment of PALI**

**4) An individuals act in the community.**

**(i.e. saved a life, helped a fellow human being, benefited a community or organization)**

**5) Exceptional or outstanding action to benefit another/others**

**(i.e. The nominee's actions, solely, convicted a criminal or cleared a wrongfully convicted person, prevented a crime, tragedy, or catastrophe)**

**6) Open to other unknown considerations as decided by the committee and the Board.**

**PALI NOMINATING MEMBER: Jeff Stein**

*I am forwarding something someone had forwarded to me previously about Russ, this way, I don't have to reinvent the verbiage.*

*Jeff Stein*

*it is with great pride that I submit Russ Kolins of Kolins' Security Group to be nominated for the James P. Carino Investigator of the year award.*

*To go further, I would like to give you a little slice of my background. I began my career with the Philadelphia Police Department at the age of 20, in 1969. I worked 11 years in uniform, mostly patrolling areas in North Philadelphia. I was promoted to Detective in 1981, and was assigned to the East Division for 8 years, and then transferred to the Homicide Unit. After 6 years working homicide investigations, and with 25 years with the Philadelphia PD, I was hired by the Camden County Prosecutors Office, where I worked in the Homicide Unit, Child Abuse Unit, Major Crimes Unit, Special Prosecutions Unit, and also the unit supervisor of the Insurance Fraud Unit, and participated in multi-jurisdictional investigations with the FBI, US Marshal's Office, and State Police in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. I retired after 16 years of employment with that organization, and shortly after became a licensed Private Detective in Montgomery County.*



*During my law enforcement career, I crossed paths with many Private Investigators, who were working on the defense side of cases. In those many years, the name Russ Kolins' was always associated with the epitome of trust, integrity, dogged detective skills, and leaving no question unanswered as to the TRUTH of each and every case that he investigated. In doing so, Russ has always been able to bridge the gap of trust between communications with law enforcement, and the Defense itself; often being the catalyst for investigators, prosecutors, and Judges to review his findings, and leading to acquittal, release and/or exoneration in numerous cases. To this day, he is regarded even higher on both sides of the criminal justice aisle; again viewed with the highest degree of integrity. The reason being - Russ Kolins' has also been the consummate Detective - the seeker of truth, and worked at increasing his knowledge at anything he takes on, and then, rather than keeping for himself, he educates others to what he has learned.*

*In his mid-seventies, when most are retired, Russ never misses a beat when it comes to his commitment to investigation. Over the past year we have dealt with Covid, civil unrest, and National turmoil. None of those things deterred him from continuing his work. When a Philadelphia Police Inspector was arrested for allegedly assaulting a rioter, last year, it was Russ Kolins' who voluntarily stepped up and provided the investigative services of his entire working staff to properly and impartially investigate this matter. Rather than the Philadelphia Police Department studying the frame by frame camera footage of the entire event, interviewing all witnesses, and conducting an in depth investigation, Inspector Joseph Bologna was quickly arrested for a crime he never committed. In spite of Inspector Bologna's case being dismissed twice in a court of law, he has been re-arrested, and awaits yet another Court Hearing.*

*Something else to add is that Russ not only investigated each and every detail of the above matter, he conducted an investigative analysis into the rioting, burning, looting, assaults, robberies, and the Police response in several areas of downtown Philadelphia, particularly focusing on crowd control and deployment of law enforcement. He goes above and beyond in anything he takes on.*

*In the past, Russ was also hired as an expert in the Pulse Nightclub, and Mandalay Bay mass murder cases, and in spite of carrying a beyond full time work load as a security expert, finds time to give back to others in what he has learned in his 52 years as an investigator. He is on the faculty of The Southern Police Institute, and teaches at The University of Louisville, Louisville, Kentucky, where he is an instructor in Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design. He also flies around other parts of the Country training at Police Academy's, most recently at The South Dakota Police Academy located in Aberdeen, Dakota.*

*I could go on and on at who Russ Kolins' is, his accomplishments, and how is deserving of this award. In short, he is and will forever be the consummate Licensed Investigator, and the foundation that he stands as the expert in safety and security - globally.*

# PALI MEMBER SPOTLIGHT- RUSSELL “RUSS” KOLINS

When I wrote those rules in 2022 I must have had Russ Kolins in mind because if I started to write every school, training and good deed Russ attended and performed, we would crash the internet! Conversely, it is nearly impossible to speak of Russ Kolins in 750 words or less.

I have submitted Russ to be selected as the PALI Member Spotlight partly because after several nominations, he has been selected by unanimous vote, as the PALI Investigative Professional of the Year , partly because when Sandy and I go anywhere in the United States, as soon as Investigators and attorneys learn we are from Pennsylvania, we are asked, “Do you know Russ Kolins?!” and mostly because, there are few investigative professionals as deserving of this spotlight, as Russel “Russ” Kolins.

Sandy and I started in the private investigation business because of Jeff Stein. If it were not for him, we would not be private investigators. I look up to Jeff and he has been my sounding board for many situations, circumstances, and dilemmas in the industry. He is a mentor, a confidant and a friend. There are a few PI’s that Jeff always speaks of in the highest regards. And like E.F. Hutton, when Jeff Stein speaks, people listen. So when I would hear the name “Russ Kolins” over and over again it stuck as a person I wanted to get to know. And get to know Russ I did.

Russ is the calm, quiet type of man who you can tell you do not want to cross. He commands the room with his mere presence. If Jeff Stein is like E.F. Hutton, Russ Kolins IS E.F. Hutton. As a matter of fact, the saying in Philadelphia is: “When Russ Kolins talks E.F. Hutton listens!” and if you go anywhere where Russ is, you will quickly learn when he speaks, everyone listens.

I am not going to belabor this article with the awards and schools Russ has received and attended because he has more degrees than a thermometer and that is part of the nominations that are published in this newsletter befitting of the award recipient.

What I am going to tell you is the back story. The human side. The part that makes you want to know Russ and the part that will make you appreciate him even more.

Many of us know Russ from conferences or because he is the world renowned and I mean WORLD renowned expert in risk management, risk assessments, premises liability, security inspections and civil liability. Behind the polished expert who lectures, teaches, educates, consults and instructs, Russ is a family man. A loving husband, grandson, son, father and grandfather.





Russ followed in his mother's footsteps, Sophia Bell Girten Kolins, who was in the United States Army in WWII, and he joined the United States Marines. If you know anything about the United States military, you know that once a Marine, always a Marine. But even in the military, Russ was a Marine's Marine!


Russ is always the first to volunteer and even faster to open his wallet. He has donated thousands of dollars to charities and associations and perhaps hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of his time. As a Certified Criminal Defense Investigator (CCDI), Russ is responsible for the release of four innocent men who were wrongly convicted and received the death penalty or life imprisonment. He handled each of those matters pro-bono.

One of these "freed" men was Andrew Swainson. In March of 2023, Andrew spoke at the INTELNET Conference in Orlando Florida at the awards banquet where Russ was receiving the Intellent Special Recognition Award. In a moving speech, Andrew, who at the time was serving a life sentence for murder explained how he "Feared for Russell's safety as Russell was walking the streets of Philadelphia interviewing dangerous people." It is not often you hear a man who is serving a life sentence for murder tell you he fears anything, yet alone the safety of another man.

When Russ spoke after Andrew, Russ quietly explained he was a United States Marine, had no fear walking the streets of Philadelphia, and did what he needed to do because it was the right thing and needed to be done. No pomp and circumstance, no request for grandeur or notoriety, just a smile and a cavalier attitude like: "I only did what anyone else would do."

He was simply "A United States Marine." Truth be told, Russ is a Vietnam War Veteran who received several awards. One such citation, for the Navy Commendation Medal was earned for his performance under intense hostile mortar fire during a helicopter evacuation of wounded Marines.

In the words of the citation:

A large, faded version of the United States Marine Corps seal is centered in the background of the quote.

**“COMPLETELY DISREGARDING HIS OWN SAFETY, CORPORAL KOLINS POSITIONED HIMSELF IN THE LANDING ZONE, EXPOSED TO ENEMY FIRE AND ASSISTED THE CASUALTIES ABOARD MEDICAL EVACUATION AIRCRAFT. DISREGARDING THE HOSTILE ROUNDS IMPACTING NEARBY, HE FEARLESSLY CONTINUED THIS HEROIC COURSE OF ACTION UNTIL ALL OF HIS INJURED COMRADES HAD BEEN REMOVED FROM THE HAZARDOUS AREA.”**

Russ is incredibly humble and always the mild-mannered, quiet polite person in the room. You would not know he is the Nation's expert on security and risk assessments, until you speak with him. As soon as Russ begins to speak on the topic of being an expert, everything you thought you knew goes out the window. Regardless of if you spent three or thirty years in the business, regardless of just how much you thought you knew, when Russ begins to speak, you recognize you are in the company of greatness.

Sandy and I are now CPTED certified because once, at a FAPI conference in 2025, Russ spoke on CPTED and told the room it is important, and everyone should be trained in it. If Warren Buffet were to give you a stock tip, I hope you will be smart enough to take it. If Russ Kolins gives you a private investigation tip, I hope you are equally as smart.

In 1969, after returning from fighting in the Vietnam war, Russ founded the Kolins Security Group. He holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Security Management and specialized in the defense industry during the first two decades of his practice, undergoing extensive training and education in the fields of Risk Management, Risk Assessments, Premises Liability, Security Inspections, and Civil Liability.

In August 2023, Russ married his love Wendy Handler, at a grand event at the Philadelphia Hilton. In perfect Russ fashion, the magnificent wedding was complete with a Mumpers string band! If you are fortunate enough to track Russ and Wendy down, as their travel calendar is always full and often they reply to your text from faraway lands, when you speak with Russ, you learn his most cherished awards are his wife and family. Spend any amount of time with him and Wendy, and you will see it firsthand. The love and admiration he shows her is rare and speaks to the man that he is. Russ is blessed to have Wendy at his side, and he knows it and shows it.

I consider myself incredibly fortunate to have attended Russ's talks, to have spent time in his company and to have the opportunity to learn from him. Equally, I am privileged to have Russ and Wendy in my speed dial. Full disclosure, I had some help gathering the photos for this Member Spotlight although I will never reveal my source!

Congratulations Russ on receiving the 2025 PALI Investigative Professional of the Year Award. I am proud to be one of the two members who nominated you for the honor. As a recipient myself, I feel the award has become that much more prestigious because you now are also a laureate.

For Service In Vietnam:

**Ex-Marine Earns 2 Medals**

A Pennsauken veteran of the Marine Corps has been awarded the Navy Commendation Medal and the Navy Achievement Medal for service in Vietnam.



**Russell Kolins**

Russell Kolins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herb Kolins, of 3912 Sharon Street, who was discharged as a sergeant last July, recently received the awards, both with Combat V's, in special ceremonies.

The Navy Commendation Medal was earned for his performance under intense hostile mortar fire during a helicopter evacuation of wounded Marines. At the time, Kolins was serving with the Intelligence Service, Fourth Marine Battalion, Third Marine Division.

In the words of the citation, "Completely disregarding his own safety, Corporal Kolins positioned himself in the landing zone, exposed to enemy fire and assisted the casualties aboard medical evacuation aircraft.

"Disregarding the hostile rounds impacting nearby, he fearlessly continued this heroic course of action until all of his injured comrades had been removed from the hazardous area."

The Navy Achievement Medal was earned by Kolins for his service with the headquarters company in connection with combat operations against the enemy from March 4 to May 8, 1968.

The citation states that "as the intelligence assistant, he displayed outstanding professionalism and initiative despite extremely adverse conditions and difficulties of combat environment. Distinguishing himself by his consistently high level of efficiency, he materially enhanced the operational effectiveness of his unit."

A 1964 graduate of Pennsauken High School, Kolins attended Trenton State and Temple University before entering the Marines. He is presently continuing his studies at Camden County College.



# PALI BYLAWS & POLICIES UPDATE

## PALI BYLAWS

As you may be aware, the PALI board of directors has been working for the past year on updating the bylaws and creating a PALI policy manual. A copy of the updated bylaws was emailed to every full member of PALI in August 2025. The vote was in favor of approving the updated bylaws. These bylaws are now available to read on the PALI website. I strongly urge all members to read and be knowledgeable of the bylaws of any organization or association you belong to.

A little over a year ago, The Chair of the Board of Directors approached me and said with my knowledge and expertise in writing policies and procedures, would I consider working on updating PALI's bylaws. The task was taken on many times in the past but never completed. With the full support of Eileen Law and President Rick Carpenter, I took on the challenge.

Rewriting bylaws is not an easy task. There is a lengthy and detailed process that goes into conducting and undertaking such a task. First is the research phase where old bylaws of the association are attempted to be located and reviewed and along with that is the research as to what other similar associations are doing.

The draft phase is next where a small group of dedicated individuals takes time to methodically put on paper what they believe will best serve the association and the members taking into consideration current industry best practices. After the draft is completed, it is sent to the full board to be reviewed and considered and then, a discussion is held, and suggested changes are made. More discussion and after all changes and opinions are heard, a vote takes place.

Once the bylaws are accepted in draft by the full board of directors, they are sent to PALI legal counsel for review. PALI legal counsel returns them with suggested changes and questions. They are reviewed and updated again and then, after a final review by PALI legal counsel, they are sent to the full membership for a vote.

As the author of the bylaws, I am proud to have been able to take part in this project.

I am very appreciative of the full board of directors' efforts in getting this task completed. It is the work of the full board that allowed this task to become a reality. We can all be proud that the bylaws have been updated under our watch.

I look forward to this document steering PALI for years to come.





# PALI BYLAWS & POLICIES UPDATE

## PALI POLICY MANUAL

Not to rest on the laurels of a task well done, a complete policy manual was also needed for PALI. If you think writing bylaws is daunting, you should try to write policies. The process of writing policies is not rocket science, it is just time consuming.

Here are the steps taken to create the PALI policy manual:

First, The Chair of the board of directors made the request. I looked at it as an honor to be able to write the draft policy manual for PALI.

I researched the normal policies the federal government likes to see when reviewing a 501c3 or 501c6 status along with my knowledge of the important policies for a business to have. Policies such as ethics, core values, roles and responsibilities, committees, records retention, whistle blower protection, discrimination, complaints, investigations, discipline, budget, finance and audits, conflict of interests, newsletter and listserv.

Next, sample policies from others I have written along with others from other state and municipal agencies were reviewed. A draft policy is then created trying to best meld what is being used by other agencies and what will work for PALI.

Once the drafts were created, the president assigned one policy to each board of director. The directors were all tasked with forming their own committee from the membership and collectively, reviewing the draft policy and using whatever they saw fit to create their draft. The drafts I created were never expected to remain intact; they were simply the catalyst for the Board and committee members to use to get started. Some of the policy drafts remained partially intact, others were totally replaced with what that committee felt would best serve the Association.

The next step was for the draft policy's to be reviewed by PALI legal counsel. If you thought Attorney Borzillo was busy with the bylaws, you can only imagine what it was like for her to review 15 different policies. As always, here review was exactly what you would expect from a law school professor. It is amazing what you can learn simply by asking Attorney Borzillo to review your document. She is nothing short of amazing.

Once returned complete with comments and suggestions, the documents are now in the final review stage. The suggestions from PALI legal counsel will be reviewed and the updated documents will go to the full board for review and vote. I am cautiously optimistic that by the December 2025 newsletter, you will have the update on the final documents. and these needed policies will be available on the PALI website.

It was indeed an honor to be asked to write the policy manual for PALI. My thanks to President Carpenter for making sure this critical piece of governance is complete.
